The Castle of Modernism

Paths of **Modernism**

Art in the Soviet Occupied Zone/GDR 1945-1990

The second part of the exhibition Paths of Modernism, which covers around 300 sqm, displays more than 100 works of fine and applied art from the period 1945-1990. It thus completes the 20th century art presented in the entire first floor of the south, west and north wing, illuminating the history of the museum's collections.

The museum's presentation of post-1945 art draws on its own collection, which due to the historical conditions of the time is first and foremost a col-lection of the art of the former GDR. Acknowledging and embracing this regional and historical context, the exhibition of the art of the second half of the century focusses on the many varied forms of artistic expression found in the former Soviet Occupied Zone/German Democratic Republic.

The exhibition kicks off with works produced in Halle (Saale) from the late 1940s to the mid-1950s, a period in which artists such as Hermann Bachmann, Herbert Kitzel, Horst Strempel and Theo Balden attempted to make a fresh start in their art by drawing links to the modernist style the National Socialists had banned. The formalism debate that raged from 1948 onwards caused many of them to leave East Germany in disappointment and move to the West.

The core part of the exhibition contrasts official socialist and realist positions with works by artists who sought to stay in touch with international trends or tried to develop modernist positions further. Works by Werner Tübke, Wolfgang Mattheuer, Willi Sitte and Willi Neubert, for example, are placed side by side with the works of Hermann Glöckner, Robert Rehfeldt, Wasja Götze, Hans Ticha, A. R. Penk and Hartwig Ebersbach. Works by Einar Schleef, Wolfram Ebersbach, Clemens Gröszer, Norbert Wagenbrett. Eberhard Göschel. Peter Makolies and Hartmut Bonk take us into the years leading up to the reunification of the two German states.

On the second floor of the north wing, the exhibition is supplemented with further temporary presentations on individual topics and artists or of works that can only be shown for limited periods of time for conservation reasons. The first of these supplementary exhibitions, showing until the summer of 2019, features the socalled Halle School, presenting works created between 1945 and 1960 by artists including Hermann Bachmann, Fritz Baust, Kurt Bunge, Charles Crodel, Albert Ebert, Erwin Hahs, Otto Müller, Karl Völker, and Gustav Weidanz. Exhibitions on photography and graphic art in East Germany as well as other topics will follow.
